FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

Last Sunday was a busy and encouraging one at St. Nick's. In the morning, we celebrated our Harvest Thanksgiving at the 10.30 Eucharist. It was a surprise, although not an unpleasant one, to have Bishop Stephen in the congregation and to welcome a little group of the Brownies who meet in our hall. Our thanks to all who contributed so generously to the largest display of gifts in recent memory and to those who arranged them so impressively in front of the altar, and those who decorated the church so beautifully.

It was also our Parish Giving Renewal Sunday, and we also presented the pledges that had been received at the offertory. So far, we have had 34 responses which represent an additional £9,700 per annum with Gift Aid. Our target is to bridge the gap between income and expenditure which is £2,000 per month; so we still have some way to go before we achieve this. In the meantime, thanks to those who have responded so generously; and to Joan Beresford and Sandra Grattrick who did the work. If you have not yet returned your pledge form, I encourage you to do so. It would be good to have reached this target before a new parish priest takes up their post. This Sunday's Gospel reading has Jesus speaking about our relationship with money!

In the afternoon we had the latest in our occasional series of 'Songs of Praise.' This continued the harvest theme, but also included some requests from members of the congregation. Each hymn was introduced with a commentary by me. It was a great pleasure to be joined for this service by some members of the Salvation Army. Our thanks to the choir, organist Brian Medcalf, our accompanist on the piano, Linda Hepburn-Booth, and conductor Jane Ellis; and to those who provided the splendid tea we enjoyed after the service

Our autumn series of Bible studies is now under way on Tuesday afternoons and Wednesday evenings. On Wednesday this week we also welcome the members of the Deanery Synod, which will be meeting here.

Looking forward, we have just sent out invitations to our All Souls-tide service of Commemoration of the Departed on the afternoon of Sunday 3rd November. These have gone to all those who have had family funerals here over the past year. The service is open to anyone. There will be list in church for names of departed family members and friends you would like to be included in the prayers.

Today (Wednesday) we celebrated Robert Grosseteste, theologian, philosopher, scientist, linguist and more besides, "the last man to know everything," and an energetic reforming Bishop of Lincoln in the 13th century. The university named after him is in our parish. I will place some copies of my sermon about him at the back of the church.

SECOND READING

And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account.

Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, 'You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions. Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, 'How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!' And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, 'Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.' They were greatly astounded and said to one another, 'Then who can be saved?' Jesus looked at them and said, 'For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible.'

Peter began to say to him, 'Look, we have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.'

FIRST READING

GALATIANS 5:18-END

I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.
