FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PRIEST

Dear Friends,

Last week in our exploration of the Eucharist we had reached the Sanctus and Benedictus. This week we cover the remainder of the Eucharistic Prayer, the Great Thanksgiving.

The first thing to say is that unlike the Prayer Book which has only one Eucharistic Prayer, Common Worship has no less than nine (including two for use with congregations of children); expressing a richer variety of Eucharistic theology.

In the Prayers we use most often at St. Nicholas' (Prayers A, B & E) the Sanctus is followed by the Invocation of the Holy Spirit on the gifts of bread and wine so that they may become what Christ had declared them to be, his Body and Blood and our food and drink for the new life we now live in him. In contrast to the Churches of the East, the role of the Holy Spirit in the Eucharist was rather neglected in the Western Church, both in the Roman Missal and the Prayer Book. Liturgical revisions have redressed this imbalance.

An exception to this was the liturgy of the Episcopal Church in Scotland, the one which I celebrated in the first half of my ministry. This followed the Eastern pattern by having an epiclesis – an invocation of the Spirit on the elements and the people after the narrative of institution and the memorial of redemption. Two prayers we use occasionally (F & G) are based on Eastern forms and have the same structure. The Invocation of the Spirit on gifts and people remind us that we can do nothing without God's prior gift.

Then come the words of institution, understood in the West – both before and after Reformation – as the 'words of consecration.' Theologians now regard the whole prayer, not just the words of institution or the epiclesis, as consecratory. However, as the late Bishop Michael Perham wrote, there is a devotional and psychological need for acts and gestures which highlight different parts of the prayer: the president stretching out his hands and making the sign of the cross over the bread and wine at the invocation; taking the bread and wine into his hands and showing them to the people at the narrative of institution; raising the chalice and paten at the final doxology. The Eucharist is something we do, not just say.

The Lord's command (found in Luke's Gospel and Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians), "Do this in remembrance of me," is not just to remember the last supper but to participate again in the memorial of the whole mystery of his passion, death and resurrection by offering this prayer and sharing in the sacred sacrificial meal. Here our usual understanding of 'remembrance' and 'memorial,' as of people or events in a past which becomes ever more remote with the passage of time can miss the sense of the sacrament as both a present reality in which the risen Christ makes himself known in the breaking of the bread and draws

us into his sacrificial offering, and an anticipation of the coming of God's kingdom: the marriage feast of the Lamb.

After memorial acclamations which increase congregational participation – and help us concentrate in a long prayer – there follow a variety of petitions: for the acceptance of our 'sacrifice of thanks and praise,' for our formation in the likeness of Christ; for the coming of God's kingdom of justice and mercy; for the unity of the Church both here on earth and in the communion of saints, the whole company of heaven with whom we worship.

The prayers culminate in a doxology which recognises that we can only offer our worship "through and with and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit." In two of the prayers this concludes with a congregational acclamation taken from the vision of the worship of heaven in the Book of Revelation: "Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever." In all the prayers, we add our 'Amen.'

SECOND READING

PHILIPPIANS 3:4B-14

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL READING

JOHN 12:1-8

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

FIRST READING

DANIEL 3:14-20, 24-25, 28

Nebuchadnezzar said to the men, 'Is it true, O Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, that you do not serve my gods and you do not worship the golden statue that I have set up? Now if you are ready when you hear the sound of the horn, pipe, lyre, trigon, harp, drum, and entire musical ensemble to fall down and worship the statue that I have made, well and good. But if you do not worship, you shall immediately be thrown into a furnace of blazing fire, and who is the god that will deliver you out of my hands?' Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego answered the king, 'O Nebuchadnezzar, we have no need to present a defence to you in this matter. If our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the furnace of blazing fire and out of your hand, O king, let him deliver us. But if not, be it known to you, O king, that we will not serve your gods and we will not worship the golden statue that you have set up.'

Then Nebuchadnezzar was so filled with rage against Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego that his face was distorted. He ordered the furnace to be heated up seven times more than was customary, and ordered some of the strongest guards in his army to bind Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego and to throw them into the furnace of blazing fire.

Then King Nebuchadnezzar was astonished and rose up quickly. He said to his counsellors, 'Was it not three men that we threw bound into the fire?' They answered the king, 'True, O king.' He replied, 'But I see four men unbound, walking in the middle of the fire, and they are not hurt; and the fourth has the appearance of a god.' Nebuchadnezzar said, 'Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who has sent his angel and delivered his servants who trusted in him. They disobeyed the king's command and yielded up their bodies rather than serve and worship any god except their own God.

GOSPEL READING

JOHN 8:31-42

They answered him, 'We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, "You will be made free"?' Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there for ever. So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed. I know that you are descendants of Abraham; yet you look for an opportunity to kill me, because there is no place in you for my word. I declare what I have seen in the Father's presence; as for you, you should do what you have heard from the Father.'

They answered him, 'Abraham is our father.' Jesus said to them, 'If you were Abraham's children, you would be doing what Abraham did, but now you are trying to kill me, a man who has told you the truth that I heard from God.
